A Word From the Minister

Christ Is Among Us

t the time of this writing the Church is nearing the end of its 40-day season of Easter. Easter is the startling good news that in matters of life and death God has the last word; that the good purposes of God in Christ could not be defeated by sin and the grave. That is Easter. However, according to John's Gospel, the news that "Christ is risen" did not transform his disciples into bold witnesses for the kingdom of God. In fact, on the evening of the first Easter – despite Mary Magdalene's announcement to the eleven that she had seen the Lord and that not even the seemingly impenetrable shackles of death could defeat the power of God's love – Peter, James, John and company are huddled behind closed doors "for fear."

What do they fear? Doubtless they feared the authorities. Rome had already convicted and crucified Jesus for sedition, perhaps they would now seek out his followers as well. Or maybe the disciples feared the future. They had given up everything to follow Jesus, believing that he was God's Messiah, and now they were left to face an uncertain future on their own. Or maybe they feared God. Perhaps they were afraid that Mary was right and that Jesus was raised. If God could raise a lifeless corpse from the grave, imagine what God could do to a group of cowardly would-be disciples who betrayed, denied, and deserted Jesus in his hour of greatest need. Regardless, it's Easter evening and the news of Christ's resurrection has not lifted the Good Friday pall that caused his terrified followers to cower behind bolted doors.

So what transformed the frightened disciples into courageous witnesses for the gospel? In a word, presence. The news "Christ is risen" was not enough to make their hearts leap with joy; it was not sufficient to move them outside of their locked hideout. Rather, it was the presence of the risen Christ who came to his followers in their bewilderment and fear and offered them his peace that made all the difference. Whatever the future held, they now trusted that it and they were in the hands of God. The good news "Christ is risen" more importantly meant they were not alone!

There is a tendency sometimes to believe that churches are useful, helpful institutions in and of themselves. Although no one would ever articulate it out loud there is sometimes an attitude that lingers in the air that if God were somehow to disappear from the scene the church would continue to be a fine, character-building organization contributing to the physical and emotional well-being of the community. But John's Gospel dispels that illusion. If you want to see what becomes of the church when it is deprived of its central holy presence, just sneak a peek at First Church Jerusalem hunkered defensively in a darkened room, peeking through the window to make certain the world isn't out to get them. In the absence of God, the church is hollow, void of meaning and purpose, fearfully locked behind its own institutional façade.

However, the good news is that into the midst of this emptiness, into the centre of this despairing people, the risen Christ comes and says "Peace be with you." The risen Christ is among us as our peace, breathing his Spirit of life on us, equipping us with everything we need for the adventure of being his Church. So be it.

Art at A&P

Metalsmith Paul Beau Created a Masterwork for the Chapel

hile sitting in church during the Sunday service, my eyes often wander toward the elegant wrought-iron screen that separates the side chapel from the rest of the church. The filigree of finely wrought, black iron scrolls spans two arched openings and closes off the small chapel, creating an intimate space for less formal services. It is the work of Montreal-born metal craftsman Paul Beau (1871-1949), who in the first decades of the twentieth century was one of the most prominent metalsmiths in Canada.

Beau was perhaps best known in Montreal for the brass and copper jardinières, vases, desk sets, and coffee services he created by hand and sold through the Canadian Handicrafts Guild or from his Mountain St. shop in the period from about 1907 to 1917. Beau's "artistic brasses," as he advertised them, were as highly regarded for wedding gifts as silver from Montreal's well-known Henry Birks & Sons. Contrasting the

golden lustre of brass with the reddish tones of copper in his pieces, Beau borrowed freely from various styles, hammering out natural leaf shapes inspired by English Arts and Crafts design or using geometric patterns from the antique. He insisted on handcrafting each piece, according to the traditional art of metalsmithing.

In 1919, Beau's reputation was such that he was invited to carry out all the wrought iron work for the rebuilding of the Centre Block of the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa, which had been destroyed by fire in 1916. For seven years, Beau managed a workshop of blacksmiths and craftsmen on Parliament Hill to produce the ornate andirons, fire-tools, fireplace fenders and decorative railings and grilles, which may still be seen throughout the offices, reading rooms and halls of the House of Commons and Senate chambers.

Afterwards, in about 1933, Beau was commissioned to create the screen for the Church of

St. Andrew & St. Paul, after a design by architect H. B. Stout. The left panel incorporates the heraldic coat-of-arms of the Meredith family, who donated the chapel to the church, and the right panel shows a shield with the figures of St. Andrew and St. Paul. If you look closely at details in the screen, you can admire the leafy wroughtiron scrolls ending in small rosettes, the finials of lilies and tulips, and even a small pumpkin in this showpiece of metalsmithing.

Paul Beau continued working up until his death in 1949 at the age of 78. The war years were difficult for Beau, because metal was scarce, and people no longer wanted to afford handcrafted wares. For many years his work was forgotten until about the 1980s, when collectors and museums began to rediscover the beauty of his art. The church may be proud to have this masterwork by one of Canada's top metal artists.



From the Choir

A Busy Spring Agenda Offered Many Opportunities to Choir Members

hoir preparations for Holy Week began with the first of the year. Scores for Bach's *St John Passion* were passed out during choir rehearsal, and the rehearsals commenced. For many choristers, this was a return to a labour of love — revisiting Bach's telling of the Good Friday story based on the Gospel according to St. John. For new members of the choir, it was an experience of wonder and excitement.

Under the direction of Jordan de Souza, we all learned more about Bach and about the meaning of each chorus, recitative passage and aria — thus gathering a deeper understanding of the enlightened composer himself and his insight into the Passion story. When the performance arrived, the choir sang as one voice. And it was an incredible experience to sing with the highly skilled musicians of Ensemble Caprice who played so exquisitely on period instruments.

For the choir, the focus on the *St John Passion* brought a sense of immediacy to the experience of Holy Week — Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and joyous Easter. Together with the clergy and congregation, we moved through this sacred time, finding deep meaning in the progressive services. Again, the choir is deeply grateful to both Jordan de Souza and Jonathan Oldengarm for their guidance and musical mastery.

There were more special musical events emerging from the choir during the months from January to April. On March 2, Celebration Sunday, the choir sang the wonderful work by Benjamin Britten called Rejoice in the Lamb. Then on March 14, many choir members participated in the church congregational dinner and fundraiser for new choir chairs. While some choristers were helping with the silent auction or serving dinner, others were "singing for their supper"—sharing a delightful song program for those present. And if that was not enough, 13 singers and pianists (Jonathan and Jordan) came together on April 4 for a cabaret performance in the church sanctuary to raise funds for the music program.

The variety of talent present thrilled the audiences of both the congregational dinner and the cabaret. In fact, more and more of the vocal solos for choir events are now being performed by choir members. This year alone, more than 20 of the choir singers sang solos in services and church-related events. Such opportunities give our choral singers a chance to demonstrate their unique and wonderful talent both within and outside of the church choir context. And the results are so delightful and exciting!

The choir also performed at the concert in honour of Wayne Riddell on May 25. This dear and gifted man has been a source of inspiration for so many musicians throughout Canada, as well as a source of ongoing support and encouragement for the A&P music department. It was truly a joy for the choir to participate in the celebration.
